## DR. GEORGE T. LOVE **CALLED TO ETERNITY**

Well Known Wenona Physician Passed Away Monday At Streator Hospital.

Dr. George T. Love, 66, practicing physician in Wenona for the past 24 years, and previous to that following his profession in Dana for 14 years, died in St. Mary's hospital in Streator at 5:50 o'clock Monday evening, following an illness of several months' duration.

He had been a patient in the Streator hospital but a week, being removed there from the Passavant hospital in Chicago, where he had been receiving treatment for an ailment which balked the knowledge of the best physicians and surgeons.

The passing of this fine character, who for years aided in relieving suffering among residents of the neighboring communities, has brought deep sorrow to many. He was a man of unusually high ideals through which he earned the respect of his fellow citizens. A most genial personality bespoke his Southern origin, Dr. Love being born in Gallatin, Tenn., February 4, 1873, the son of Hugh E. Love and Mary Love. He was a lover of good music and other fine arts, aiding in any cause for the furtherance of such projects in the community. He had a legion of admirers, all of whom are grieved over the loss of their physician and friend.

He was an active member of the Wenona Methodist church, and was affiliated with the county, state and national medical associations.

After being graduted from the local schools and academy at Gallatin, Dr. Love taught in a country school in Tennessee, after which he took a course in a business college in Nashville.
